<p><b>USDA Releases EIS on GM Alfalfa</b></p> <p>December 16, 2010 - The US Department of Agriculture released the final environmental impact statement (EIS) that evaluates the potential environmental effects of deregulating Roundup Ready GM Alfalfa covering three possible outcomes: Retain the regulated status, grant nonregulated status, or establish geographic restrictions and isolation distances on production. <a href="#">More on USDA EIS on GM alfalfa.</a></p> <p><b>USDA Offers Conservation Funding to Organic Producers</b></p> <p>USDA will provide funding to help organic producers and those transitioning to organic production implement resource conservation practices on their agricultural operations. The proposed rule would extend the exemptions for these substances, which have a sunset date of September 12, 2011, on the National List. <a href="#">Twelve Substances Info.</a></p> <p><b>ERS Issues New Report on Organic Contracts</b></p> <p>The Economic Research Service (ERS) report, "The Role of Contracts in the Organic Supply Chain: 2004 and 2007," details the extent and reasoning in contracting organic operations. The report is based on survey data collected from certified organic processors, distributors, and manufacturers.
